ORDINANCE 2018-524-E

AN ORDINANCE REGARDING THE USE OF THE TREE MITIGATION TRUST FUND; AMENDING, CHAPTER 111 (SPECIAL REVENUE AND TRUST ACCOUNTS), PART 7 (ENVIRONMENT AND CONSERVATION), SECTION 111.760 (TREE PROTECTION AND RELATED EXPENSES TRUST FUND), ORDINANCE CODE, TO PROHIBIT THE USE OF TRUE DATE PALMS FOR NEW PLANTINGS BY THE CITY WITH SPECIFIC EXCEPTIONS; PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

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WHEREAS, Jacksonville's Tree Commission, created pursuant to Ordinance 2017-397-E, passed a Resolution expressing an official position against the planting of True Date Palms (scientific name *Phoenix dactylifera*) ("True Date Palm") using appropriations from the Tree Protection and Related Expenses Trust Fund ("Tree Fund"); and

21 WHEREAS, True Date Palms are not native to the City of 22 Jacksonville; and

23 WHEREAS, True Date Palms are native to arid and hot 24 environments such as the deserts of the Middle East and thrive in 25 those conditions, but not in the humid environment of Jacksonville, 26 thus the True Date Palms frequently contract a fungus that causes 27 decline and frond droop; and

WHEREAS, the salinity in the air over the land mass in close proximity to the Atlantic Ocean may result in reduced susceptibility to disease and decline; and WHEREAS, a copy of the Date Palm Boundary Map is attached hereto as Exhibit 2; and

3 WHEREAS, a single True Date Palm costs approximately \$5,000.00
4 installed and guaranteed for one year by the City's continuing
5 contract landscape contractor; and

6 WHEREAS, a single True Date Palm costs approximately \$300.00
7 to \$500.00 per year to maintain due to the required careful
8 trimming of palm fronds and removal of the True Date fruit; and

9 WHEREAS, pursuant to Sec. 25.02(g), *Charter*, a date palm 10 cannot be used as a Mitigation Tree (Replacement Tree) because it 11 is not expressly identified as such and is not an "indigenous tree 12 that reaches a height at maturity of at least 45 feet and a spread 13 at maturity of at least 30 feet"; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Sec. 94.105(a), Ordinance Code, one of the Tree Commission's purposes is to study and make recommendations to the City Council with respect to the planting of trees and the health of the City's tree canopy; and

18 WHEREAS, the Tree Commission has made such a recommendation 19 through the formal resolution process, a copy of which is attached 20 hereto as Exhibit 1; now, therefore

BE IT ORDAINED by the Council of the City of Jacksonville: 21 22 111 (SPECIAL REVENUE Section 1. Chapter AND TRUST ACCOUNTS), Part 7 (Environment and Conservation), Sec. 111.760 23 (Tree Protection and Related Expenses Trust Fund), Ordinance Code. 24 25 111, (SPECIAL REVENUE AND TRUST ACCOUNTS), Part 7 Chapter (Environment and Conservation), Section 111.760 (Tree Protection 26 and Related Expenses Trust Fund), is hereby amended to read as 27 28 follows:

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Chapter 111 (SPECIAL REVENUE AND TRUST ACCOUNTS)

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Part 7 (Environment and Conservation)

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Sec. 111.760. - Tree Protection and Related Expenses Trust Fund.

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There is created within the General Trust and Agency Fund a 4 trust fund account to be known as the Tree Protection and Related 5 Expenses Trust Fund, hereinafter referred to as the Fund, into 6 7 which shall be deposited all contributions and fines collected or imposed, together with any donation, gift, grant, or other sum of 8 9 money as may from time to time be appropriated by Council, and all 10 monies recovered by the City as civil fines pursuant to Section provided, however, monies 11 656.1208; that collected as administrative costs or attorneys' fees or costs of litigation 12 shall be paid directly to the City. The funds deposited in this 13 trust fund, together with any interest accrued thereon, shall be 14 15 expended for providing trees and incidental landscaping, and maintaining trees, within City rights-of-way and on other lands 16 17 owned by the City, its agencies or authorities, or upon which other ownership control may be exerted by the City, its agencies or 18 19 authorities, including parks, public areas and easements, and also 20 along all other public rights-of-way and on all other public lands 21 in Duval County.

The funds deposited in this trust fund may also be used to pay the salary and benefits of one City Arborist position. The City Arborist position authorized herein shall be exclusively focused on the planting of trees and other activities directly supporting planting projects in the City which utilize monies from this trust fund.

The Director of Finance and Administration is authorized and directed to make disbursements from this fund, after Council appropriation, upon written requisition for such purposes signed

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jointly by the Director of Public Works and the Director of Parks, Recreation and Community Services. Monies deposited in this trust fund shall not lapse at the close of any fiscal year, but shall carry over to the next fiscal year.

5 In no case whatsoever shall these trust funds be considered as the sole source of revenue for funds necessary to meet the normal 6 7 landscaping needs of the City's recreation, park or conservation lands, or public right-of-way. The total amount appropriated from 8 9 these trust funds for tree maintenance in any fiscal year shall not 10 exceed an amount equal to twenty-five percent of the amount budgeted in that fiscal year for tree maintenance activities in the 11 12 Public Works Department. Any appropriation of trust funds for tree maintenance shall be used to supplement, not replace, monies 13 otherwise appropriated for tree maintenance by the Public Works 14 15 Department, and shall be used to undertake activities intended to extend the life of existing trees. 16

17 The Fund shall not be used for the purchase of Phoenix dactylifera (True Date Palm), unless: (1) it is for the replacement 18 19 of a Phoenix dactylifera that meets both of the following 20 conditions: (a) The palm has been damaged due to a man-made 21 incident or lightening. Decline due to fungus, disease, or related failure due to incompatible soil conditions or habitat, shall not 22 23 be a reason for replacement; (b) The palm is part of a streetscape 24 scheme that would become visually imbalanced if not replaced with the same genus and species of palm; or (2) The palms are planted in 25 26 the area delineated as described as follows: Beginning at the 27 confluence of the St. Johns River and the Atlantic Ocean, follow 28 the southern edge of the St. Johns River westward, then south 29 southwest, to the eastern edge of Helen Cooper Floyd Park; then 30 southeast to the western boundary of the State Road A1A right-of-

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way; then southeast along the western boundary of State Road A1A 1 2 right-of-way to the western boundary of the Mayport Road right-of-3 way; then generally south along the western boundary of the Mayport Road right-of-way to and across Atlantic Boulevard; then 4 5 continuing south along the western boundary of the Florida Boulevard right-of-way to the western boundary of the Penman Road 6 7 right-of-way; then south along the western boundary of the Penman Road right-of-way, to and across Beach Boulevard; then east along 8 9 the southern boundary of the Beach Boulevard right-of-way to the western boundary of the 3rd Street right-of-way; then south along 10 the western boundary of the 3rd Street right-of-way to the Duval 11 County line; then east to the Atlantic Ocean; then north along the 12 mean high water line to the point of beginning, as depicted on the 13 14 map attached to Ordinance 2018-524-E. * * * 15 Section 2. Effective Date. This ordinance shall become 16 effective upon signature by the Mayor or upon becoming effective 17 without the Mayor's signature. 18 19 20 Form Approved: 21
